



## PPTA SURVEY OF THE NZ PUBLIC 18 YEARS AND OVER CHARTER SCHOOLS RESULTS 13 MARCH 2013

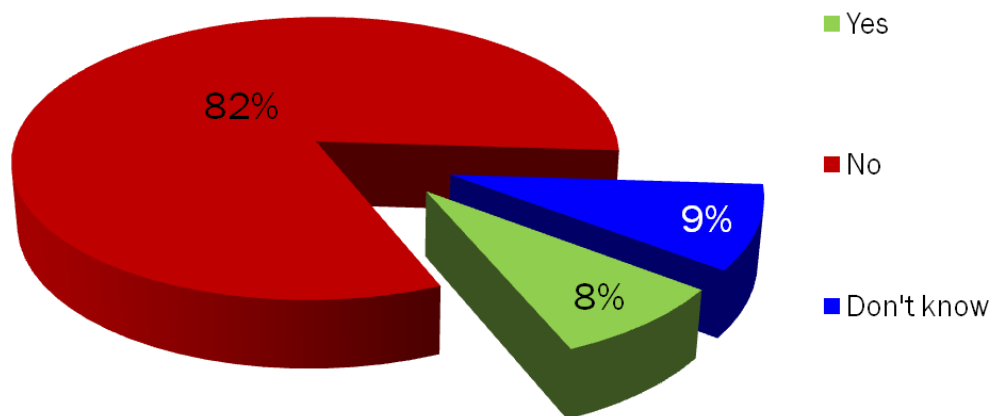
This report presents the results from a telephone survey of 600 members of the New Zealand Public, 18 years and over. This survey was conducted by MMResearch™ from 09 May 2013 to 12 May 2013 using a nationwide random telephone sample,

Data in this report has been weighted to correct for any gender imbalance in the achieved sample. The “n=” values reported are unweighted to allow accurate Maximum Margins of Error to be calculated as follows:

- Maximum MoE for Females: ±5.0%. (95% confidence)
- Maximum MoE for Males: ±6.6%. (95% confidence)
- Maximum MoE for Overall: ±4.0%. (95% confidence)

**Question 1:**

**Do you think taxpayer funded charter schools should be allowed to employ untrained and unregistered teachers?**

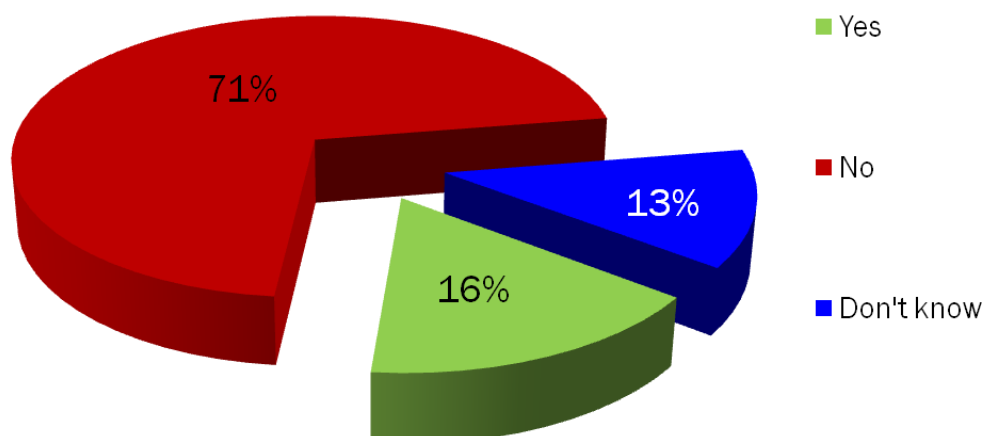

Figures in red indicate where the result for one gender is significantly higher than for the other.

Question 2:

**Do you think private owners should be allowed to make a profit from taxpayer funded charter schools?**

No	76%	65%	71%
Don't know	12%	14%	13%

Figures in red indicate where the result for one gender is significantly higher than for the other.

**Observations**

Of those who answer “Yes” (8%) to Unregistered Teachers, half say “No” to Private Profit Making and two fifths say “Yes” to Private Profit Making

Of those who answer “No” (82%) to Unregistered Teachers, four out of five say “No” to Private Profit Making only one in ten (9%) say “Yes” to Private Profit Making

Of those who answer “Don’t know” (9%) to Unregistered Teachers, more than one in four (29%) say “No” to Private Profit Making only one in ten (11%) say “Yes” to Private Profit Making
